

App Launched

I will go back a step here, because not everybody is up with the latest smartphone technology. In fact not everybody has a smartphone. And perhaps you've always wondered what it was all about. And that is fair enough, in a world where things are changing at a ridiculous pace.

So here is an explanation of what it is all about. And who knows - perhaps this article may entice you to go out and purchase what you need to be part of this wonderful new development for Korumburra.

'App' stands for 'Application', and in this case it means those colourful little squares or icons, with pictures on them, that people are always pressing on their smartphones. Well from now on, anyone in Korumburra with a smartphone will be able to download the Korumburra Town App, (a simple process that takes just a minute or so), for free, and they will have a Korumburra icon on their phone. (The same as that on the front cover of this issue of the Burra Flyer.) This little icon, when pushed, will lead them into a colourful world of everything Korumburra has to offer.

It lists our businesses, all of our community groups – from sporting and services clubs to churches and our neighbourhood house; it lists where the restaurants are, which venues are for hire, what events are coming up, even where the local parks, post boxes and public toilets are! All sprinkled with beautiful photos of the area.

We are especially proud of this development for our town because we are one of the smallest towns in Australia to have its very own app.

We are also excited to have Burra Foods on board. All 35 trucks are advertising the app on the back of their trucks, as they choof around South Gippsland and back and forth to Melbourne!

The app went "live" on November 21st, and from then on, everyone was able to download it onto their smartphones. So from now on anyone in our town and anyone passing through our town can enjoy learning a little bit more about what Korumburra has to offer, literally at the push of a button (icon).

New Local History Book

Korumburra & District Road Names and Places, a new book by Bob Newton, should be available by Christmas. Hardcover, 200+ pages with photos and maps, it will be available for around \$40 at the Korumburra Newsagency and Coal Creek Historical Park.

Regular readers of the Burra Flyer will have had their appetites whetted by the fascinating excepts from this book which have been featured over the last year or so, further examples of which appear here.

Anthony's Road, Wattlebank was named after Edward and Ailsa Anthony. At the end of the 2nd World War Edward bought 640 acres which was originally William Parker's property. It was subdivided into three farms by the Soldier Settlement Board after the 2nd World War.

Known as Anthony's Estate, the three farmers were Charlie Wilson, Kevin Drennan and Ken Job. Anthony's Estate is the original farm that was called "Wattle Bank" from the wattle trees growing in the area. This is where the name came from for the settlement of Wattle Bank.

Attenborough Court, Poowong was named after Robert Attenborough who was a Councillor on the former Shire of Korumburra from 1957-1987. Robert was one of the first Commissioners on the Poowong Loch Nyora Water Works Trust in 1970. The Attenboroughs were early dairy farmers in the North Poowong area, also breeding draught horses. Robert Attenborough was a Golden Fleece fuel agent for 28 years in the Poowong district and still farms his property in 2016. Attenborough Court is located on the south side of Poowong, off Brisbane Street.

New Event Signage in Korumburra


You will have noticed at the main town entries that new poles have been erected. These have been put in place by VicRoads as a trial to enable promotional signs for community events.

The diagram (above right) shows a sample of the posts – in Korumburra there are actually 5 posts! The post configuration allows for several sizes of signs:

2 signs 3m x 500mm
2 signs 1.5m x 1m
1 sign 3m x 1m

If you want to put up a vinyl sign for your event—you will need a permit from VicRoads—call 13 11 70 and ask for a "Temporary Community Event

signing permit and application form" – there is no charge to lodge this permit.



The Korumburra community might like to consider their full calendar of events across the year to effectively share the space.

The Korumburra Round Table is happy to help coordinate the calendar – to ensure there are no clashes of timing for event signs and to hopefully display a generic sign when there are no current events.

Korumburra Horticultural Society

Summer gardening for me is mostly a matter of maintenance. It seems the weeds never stop growing. As the old adage goes; "One year's seeds, seven years weeds." I seem to have about eight year's weeds! So get after them at any opportunity – particularly just after rain when the softer soil makes them easier to dig out.

Deadheading after Spring flowering is beneficial. In many plants it will bring a fresh flush of flowers which is always nice. In many natives in particular it will promote an outbreak of bushy growth which will stop the plant getting too straggly.

Summer planting of seedlings is a risky affair unless you can be available to water them when necessary. Even in our relatively cool climate, one blast of hot sun for a few hours can be enough to wilt delicate seedlings which may never recover.

In the vegetable garden your tomatoes would be

in and growing vigorously now. They don't require large amounts of nitrogenous fertiliser which will bring leafy growth, although a small handful of blood and bone will help any that are struggling. Sulphate of Potash applied at the rate recommended on the packet



will help with flowering and therefore with the amount of fruit produced. This is my general rule for gardening; blood and bone for growth, Potash for flowers and fruit. It is a simple approach but very useful for amateurs such as myself.

We have just had our first feed of new season's potatoes. Otway Reds were the first onto the plate this year and were just delicious. We also have Dutch Cream, an all time favourite and two varieties new to us; Snow Gem and Red Norland. We have great hopes for these. I have just been planting some vegie seedlings, sweet corn, bush tomatoes and pumpkins and used a technique learned from my father-in-law. Instead of watering the seedlings, water the hole. Dig a small hole of about the right size, fill it with water or seaweed mixture and mix it all up to a sloppy mess about the consistency of wet concrete. Then plant the seedlings into this mixture. The idea is that the seedlings will get a very good start because there will be no air voids around Ron & Carole Davis the roots.

The Korumburra Horticultural Society meets at 1.30 pm on the first Tuesday of the month (except January) in the Coal Creek Auditorium. Come along on Tuesday, 7th February if you are interested in growing things and learning more about gardening.

A Community House?



A Shire Engineer's Perspective - 25 years on by Raymond A Walls

Ray wrote this article as a contribution to be held over for the 50th Anniversary of Milpara Community House (It started up in 1982 so has been operating for 34 years). Given his involvement in the establishment of this service, we feel it is fitting for this

article to be published at this time. Ray passed away recently and we extend our condolences to his family. ${\it Milpara\,Community\,House}$

I don't think any of us knew what a 'community house' would do, but it seemed to be a good idea and we had a house to spare. People talked of a 'drop in centre' and a 'coffee shop', and the glossy magazines had convinced us that 'suburban neurosis' was a major public health issue of the time. Of course there had been an attempt at something like that (the centre, I mean, not the neurosis) in a shop in Mine Road, but it had simply faded away. Vaguely I think we understood that the nature of community, family and support systems was changing in a changing world.

The council of the Shire of Korumburra had changed during the late 1950's; people who were young, or at least young in heart, had thrown out the old squabbles, abuse and fist fights of an earlier era. There was an acceptance that the proper function of Council was as much to serve people as to service land. It helped, I suppose, that in 1979 the new Shire President was Mel Cosgriff, only the second woman to sit at the table in eighty-eight years, but other councillors were also receptive to the rather vague idea. Her riding colleagues were Jack Stubington and Lester Wyatt, but country councillors were supportive. It is unfair to mention names but Noela Stubington always supported community issues and Des McRae didn't seem to be able to help himself, he just had to be involved in any innovation. The outgoing shire president was Cyril Seabrook, a gruff speaking son of the soil with a soft heart and a sense of community.

The matter wouldn't have been an issue if we hadn't had the house. I came to the shire in 1969, and one of the issues facing the town was that it was impossible to buy a block of land to build a house, and there were no property developers interested in filling the need. Being young and foolish, or perhaps both, I rushed in where others had feared to tread. Starting with Melville Avenue, we bought, developed and sold

land more in the nature of a soviet than a country shire council; so that in 1979 we found ourselves in possession of the Chaffey estate at Shellcotts Road. What we wanted, of course, was the land at the rear, which was to become Olden Court, and other land to the east. But what to do with the house? It stood on a large block of land, not quite big enough to be divided into two, the house only in fair condition.

Citizens assured the council that there was a need for a Community House. We still didn't know what it would mean, but it had developed capital letters. To those who favoured knocking down the old house, applying for a 'Government Grant' and building an edifice, the involved citizens assured council that people would feel more at home in a house than a purpose built edifice. The parking was seen as a problem, but "How many people would attend?" we asked. "Would there be a procession of deputations asking for more help?" we asked. The same citizens assured us that there would not. It didn't seem that it would cost any money in the short term, there seemed reason to think that perhaps there would not be a long term, and we had no other plans for the house. Milpara was off and running.

Of course, there *was* a long term. Those people worked and worked. The cars were parked in Shellcotts Road, but the neighbours didn't complain. By 1985 the new Shire Secretary, David Roche, and I were becoming concerned. The people-serving amenities in Korumburra were all in inadequate facilities. Milpara in the old house was bursting at the seams, the library was trying to cope with high demand and new technology, the elderly citizens were looking to extend their rooms for the third time, we were bussing kindergarten children to Loch, and the child care facilities were stretched. David and I envisaged centralising the community facilities,

perhaps in the then vacant butter factory or some other location. We invited a few people to work through the issues with us. Again, it is unfair to recall names, but I do recall the considerable input of Jan Parry and Jenny Bowman. Milpara was an immediate problem. Expansion was urgent. I came up with the idea of buying a relocatable house and putting it on blocks next to the Chaffey house. That way, when we relocated, we could take part of the centre with us, and we would retain the homely character of Milpara.

Of course, the centre never eventuated. Rightly or wrongly, the new era of economic rationalism dried up the availability of funds for country

town facility expansion. Strangely, there always seemed to be money available for consultants to do the things that our committees and councillors used to do. With Bill Clark, Mel. Des. Lester, Jack, Noela, Cyril, David and others on the council side I can feel proud of our part in the development of Milpara, blundering as our initial concepts may have been. Those who have served Milpara and participated in the activities over a quarter of a century must take the major credit for evolving the ideas and putting them into practice. It is hard to think of what else we might have done with the old house which would have had a comparable return for the community of Korumburra. Raymond A Walls

Korumburra Parlor Bowls

The Korumburra Parlor Bowls Association caters for two kinds of indoor bowls.

The first, and from which the club gains its name, is the

oldest and most traditional form of indoor nonbias bowls, parlor bowls. This game is played with six players in each team, three sitting at either end of a four metre mat. These players bowl every second end and simply roll the coloured bowls to the kitty. For over eighty years, this game has been a Korumburra and district stalwart. It has been likened to billiards on carpet where skilled players are able to snick in off other bowls or position blocking, defensive bowls or attack the kitty, but the greatest skill is in judging the speed, length and direction of a bowl to allow it to draw (sit on) to the kitty without necessarily moving the kitty at all.

Over the club's history, many well-known Korumburra families and businesses have enjoyed parlor bowls. Local businesses that used to field teams included, amongst others, Murray Goulburn with Joe's Soft Drinks, Kurrle's Garage and the Victorian Railways. Teams are still called after the original towns to which they belonged. The Burra and Kardella names continue although Jumbunna and Outtrim have been changed over recent years. Many, many

people have enjoyed, participated, competed and retired from the game.

The second type of indoor bowls game which club members enjoy is the longer mat, bias bowls version of carpet bowls. This game had its origins with lawn bowls and began in the 1950s. However, it has become a far more recent addition to the Parlor Bowls club, beginning in 2007.

Indoor bias bowls teams consist of four players and eight bowls but the game differs from parlor bowls in that each person plays two bowls from one end of the mat and then strolls to the other end for the next round of bowls. A small group of players enjoys a social night at the Outtrim hall on Monday nights and, although this form of bowls is different, many of the people play both games! But for everyone, those players who prefer only one type of indoor bowls or those who turn their hands at both, this club provides fun, friendship, enjoyment and support.

The Parlor Bowls club continues to draw wonderful people to the games of indoor bowls. Come and join us on a Monday night at Outtrim (bias bowls) or a Thursday might in the Korumburra Uniting Church hall (parlor bowls). 
