Statement from Danny O'Brien MP on coronavirus pandemic

We are facing unprecedented and worrying times. It is extremely frustrating for Gippslanders to again be subject to restrictions when most of us had done the right thing and our case numbers remain relatively low, but we must all continue to do the right thing.

That means to stay home where you can, wear a mask and support local businesses.

I understand people's frustrations and I am heartbroken for the many businesses and employees who are suffering heavily, some of whom will lose their livelihoods. However Gippslanders are a resilient bunch – we've already dealt with drought and bushfire this year and we will get through this latest setback.

Please ensure that you support local businesses as much as possible given the stay home restrictions. Our local businesses need our support now more than ever

As I talk to people and engage with them electronically, I am conscious that there are very strongly divergent views in the community between frustration about, and opposition to, restrictions and concern to keep local areas free of coronavirus

The balance needs to be somewhere in the middle and I am trying to provide information and support to my constituents to help us get through this challenging period.

It is so important that we abide by the rules and practice good hygiene because doing so will hopefully lead to the lifting of restrictions sooner rather than later.

This is a difficult time for all of us, but I know that working together we will get through it.

With COVID-19 drastically affecting the community the Citizens Advice Bureau has been forced to temporarily close its doors until the situation

However, the Centrelink and Medicare agency is still open to help clients (at least for now) with their day-to-day Centrelink and Medicare activities.

"Emails and phone messages sent to the Bureau will still be checked regularly and responded to," said Jackie Horobin, the Bureau's president.

In normal times the Bureau's Visitor Information Centre helps visitors passing through Leongatha although all this is currently in recess.

Also, in normal times the Bureau provides information and help with regard to community services and can also access web-based information services for clients where needed. The Bureau also offers a photocopying service, and offers the use of a tourism computer for those clients who haven't got smart phones.

If you live in a remote or regional part of Victoria and cannot leave home to attend a testing site, you should contact your GP, community health service or local hospital for assistance and to discuss options available to you. For more information about what's available near you, call the 24-hour coronavirus hotline 1800 675 398.

COVIDSafe Resources for Business

If notified by an employee that they have symptoms of coronavirus? The employer must direct the employee with symptoms to travel home immediately. They should be advised to be tested for coronavirus (COVID-19) as soon as possible.

The personal workspace and/or areas in the work premises frequently used by the employee, as well as other high-touch surfaces (such as door handles, kitchen facilities) frequented by the employee should be cleaned.

If notified by an employee that they have tested positive for coronavirus? You must direct the employee to travel home immediately. They should be directed to not attend the workplace until advised by the department their isolation period is complete. All employees and the health and safety representative should be advised there has been a case of coronavirus and to be vigilant for the onset of symptoms. Advise employees to isolate and get tested if symptoms develop.

You must undertake a risk assessment to help determine what actions are required.

Korumburra Show Society

(Korumburra & District A & P Society)

Cancellation of the Korumburra Show is not unprecedented. The shows for 1898 and 1938 were also cancelled. A decision was made for the third time in the History of the Korumburra Show by members of the Korumburra and District A. & P Society to cancel the show for the safety of it's town and community.

The decision has not been made lightly to cancel the show for 2021, however, again the people of Korumburra and its community need to be protected. This time it is the coronavirus which has the committee members concerned., as they cannot facilitate the correct grounds of social distancing & the unknown of where our state will be as the show comes around. These are difficult times with difficult decisions to be made.

The Korumburra Show was first cancelled in 1898 following a committee decision to postpone the show, due to the fires which were likely to still be burning at the time of show. Their decision was made a week prior to the show.

In 1938 a similar decision was made due to the dangers of infantile paralysis (the Warragul and Lang Lang shows had already been cancelled) as it was considered more important to protect the children of Korumburra and its Community from infantile paralysis, than holding the show

The committee will keep working towards a returned show in 2022.

The executive committee were just starting to organise a special guest and get some dates together for a meeting when the first lockdown occurred in



March. Through emails the committee has stayed connected, and between both stage 3 lockdowns we even held a physical committee meeting.

Thankfully for volunteers, we were able to conduct a Covidsafe community planting in Bena. We managed on the cold drizzly morning to get about 1100 plants into the ground. The landholder also provided a great bbq luncheon, where we were all able to keep our physical distance yet enjoy each other's company out of the wind and wet weather.

Between the lockdowns there was a working bee at Richie Reserve where a few of our members got involved. Woody weeds had been cut and painted (using glyphosate in dabbers), and smaller ones pulled out. This is a great

This project was in conjunction with Korumburra Landcare, Bass Coast Landcare and has been made possible through support from the Australian Federal Government's Communities Environment Program.

COMMUNITY DINNER

Coal Creek Skip Track

The idea of developing into a walking track the site of the Sunbeam and Cardiff Mine's former skip track alongside Coal Creek was first proposed as a project for the Korumburra Rotary Club during 2006. The initial proposal was to have the track begin from the Coal Creek Overflow car park and follow the existing skip track formation all the way into Richie's Reserve. However this would have required crossing the present Transfer Station access road and the construction of a substantial bridge over the creek.

A modified version was decided upon which began just over the road bridge below the Transfer Station access road and followed the creek frontagey. for approximately 1.2 kilometres to the Ritchie's Reserve

Work began on this section by Rotary Club members with the clearing of the blackberries, weeds and fallen tree branches before the track was able to be graded to form a reasonable walking surface, some of the surface consisting of mine



Several culverts were installed to facilitate all weather access to the track and to enable maintenance with a tractor possible. The Club also erected the information stand and built the replica coal skip, both of which now stand at the beginning of the track.



In spite of developing the first 600 metres of the track to a suitable standard, the project was halted from reaching its projected length and goal by an adjacent land owner who claimed to have a grazing lease over the rest of the surveyed creek frontage to the Ritchie's Reserve boundary and would not agree to allow the Club to proceed further. [It should noted that a river frontage grazing lease does not bar pedestrians from using the land.]

While maintaining the present track until a couple of years ago and due to being unable to negotiate the required extension of the creek frontage, the Club decided to quit the project and allow any other interested organisations to carry on with the work.

Indoor Swimming Pool

In line with COVID-19 restrictions, the Korumburra Indoor Swimming Pool has been closed since 23rd March. While this is disappointing for pool users, the Committee has been using this period to undertake maintenance and improvements. We have been fortunate to receive government assistance to cover expenses and running costs, meaning that the pool is being maintained in good condition.

The South Gippsland Shire has an upgrade of the disabled bathroom underway and has already completed maintenance work including painting and door repairs. The Committee has also undertaken some additional painting and repairs to seating and benches.

With support from Russell Broadbent, the Committee has successfully accessed a Community Volunteer Grant to purchase equipment for the Club's swimming program. We are looking forward to making use of these funds when swimming re-commences. In the meantime, the Committee is preparing for the health and hygiene procedures we will need to put in place to protect our users and allow us to re-open safely when government restrictions are lifted.

Our current major development will increase our occupancy for residential care from 43 to 60 beds, which we hope will help cater for the growing need in our community. This will also provide increased opportunities for employment in Aged Care for our district.

Carinya takes great pride in offering affordable housing for local and new elderly citizens of Korumburra and district. Four new units were completed earlier this year, bringing our total available for occupancy to 50. The majority of these are offered on a loan/lease tenure arrangement while some are available for rent at a very affordable price. People seeking accommodation and / or wishing to join our Carinya family should contact Carinya for a tour or for further information.

This year has been a challenging one for our Carinya family. Our residents have faced limited access to loved ones due to the various stages of lock-down brought on by the pandemic. Our staff have been truly amazing, facing so many challenges to keep our residents and themselves safe. While avoiding an outbreak is of paramount concern, staff have faced the enormous challenges in maintaining good mental health for our elderly. Extra staff have been employed to support and encourage greater digital access for families and maintain important connections with loved ones.

In addition to the challenging times caused by the pandemic, staff, residents and families have been dealing with the extensive interruptions to their lives caused by our major redevelopment. We are well into the final stages of construction of our new kitchen, dining room, laundry and 17 new rooms. We also have commenced the refurbishment of existing rooms, anticipating this will be completed by Christmas Unfortunately due to Covid 19 restrictions

development, which includes the administrative area, consultancy rooms, meeting and staff rooms. Our priority as always being to keep residents and staff safe.

While our Fund-raising Committee has had to take a step back due to social restrictions we still invite local businesses, private citizens or families of residents past and present to participate in our major fund-raising venture: "Sponsor a Room". Michael's IGA of Korumburra generously kick started this initiative with the first \$10,000 room sponsorship donation. Korumburra Rotary Club followed by pledging \$10,000 over the next three years. The family of one of our dear past residents, Jean Kirk, has also sponsored a \$10,000 room. A beautifully inscribed plaque will be placed over one of Carinya's new rooms to acknowledge the generosity of each sponsor who supports this great program.



Another exciting Fund-raising project has been the "Raise a Calf" initiative, led by Eddie Hams and Alan Fraser and supported by Nutrien/Sth

Gippsland Livestock and Alex Scott &Co. At present we have 64 steers on local farms and we look forward to inviting more farmers to participate in this program.

This could turn into a lonely time and we want you to know that you are not alone.

There were some participants who kindly offered pet minding, meal cooking and other very specialised care. The register for these services is kept by the conveners. The Arawata community has embraced the concept of phone buddies and to quote our oldest resident Jim White, (age 90) "some terrific ongoing friendships have been made" Sometimes, nothing in life is more valued than a friendly ear! As the community continues with the COVID pandemic safety protocols in this second lockdown period, there is comfort and strength to be found in your local community and we are proud to say Arawata is here for it's residents.

It will provide some much needed enjoyment after a long locked down winter.



A Tomato Tale

I had to check back to when I bought the tomato. Probably a month ago. It sat on the counter for maybe three weeks while its smaller neighbours on the truss got consumed.

I finally decided to use the big beauty - its diameter was a bit over 6cm - for a luscious tomato and cheddar sandwich on nifty home-made bread that I'd been given. The top/stem end was a bit over-ripe, but I hoped to use most of





But what was this? Scattered around the stem were half a dozen tiny pointy projections, like pinpoints under the skin, stretching it but not breaking through. Certainly not tampering.

The first cut revealed an incredible mass of germinating seeds, tiny white stems with minuscule seed leaves. Of course they had to be planted, potting mix topped with sand. Then on to the top of the fridge for nice warm bottoms.

I'd seen a seed sprouting in fruit before. I think in one of my own pulpy oranges. But never, as hordes, in a tomato. I now know the botanical term for it.

This is because I found that a major hothouse tomato grower, *Flavorite*, has a big operation just a few k's away, in Warragul. And when I asked them my questions, I got answers:

Premature germination of seeds is known as 'vivipary' - live birth. It occurs when the hormones that keep seeds dormant become exhausted by overripening or nutrient deficiency. It is generally only seen at the end of a crop in over-mature fruit. It's not very common and not inherent to any particular type.

Truss tomato varieties are numerous. The main two produced by *Flavorite*

The Tomato's Sauce?

Was my viviparious tomato one of theirs? Possibly. Flavorite and other producers sell through a central distributor. My local IGA Produce Manager was also ready with information. They select what's deemed best quality. It seems around the time of purchase the last of a Queensland crop was the most likely tomato source.

But back to the horticulture topic- vivipary. A skim through google is remarkably worthwhile. Those little corms on iris stems and baby plants on daylilies that some of us get excited about are a form of vivipary. Mangrove seeds are, by nature, viviparious. And occasional germination within fruits gaddevierg knovelibrings. flowers (see the zinnia!) reveals a whole new field of

Ahh - the more you know the more you don't know.

He noticed a dead tree with a stone in front showing the tree had been planted to honour a founding member of the society. Mrs.Margaret Brumley, who was known to some current members, two of whom went to school with her sons.Various relatives still live in the area.We plan to replace the tree, which we think is a type of araucaria, perhaps the monkey puzzle tree Araucaria araucaria, which grows to approximately 30 to 40 metres. This is not a common tree, and nothing will be tempted to climb it, but it sure makes a statement. They are available, and when we are able to meet again the members will discuss how we might best go about planting.

Since we have been staying home in the past months many people have take-up gardening, and those who previously just pottered about have turned to gardening for the pleasure and solace it gives, not to mention flowers and food. Growing foods become more popular, and everyone can do it, from a potfuls of spuds to a full blown yard of fruit and veggies. Its an addictive and extremely rewarding activity. Any house can be improved by a garden, and Gippsland is a great place to be a gardener.



Korumburra Round Table

At a time of so much sadness and uncertainty for so many people, the Round Table has continued to work online and behind the scenes, liaising with council and the community, so that when restrictions are finally lifted and we are all out and about again, our town will see exactly where we are heading – and we have a lot of positives to tell you about!

At our latest meeting...

The main item on the agenda was the update from the council's major projects duo of Penni Ellicott and Jareth Goss, who were able to update us on: the Korumburra Hub, the Rail Trail, the Streetscape, and the Skate Park, all of which are now no longer a pipe dream awaiting funding, but are some way along the process to completion.

Firstly, on the Community Hub at the old kinder site, we were excited to learn that there have been half a dozen meetings with the architects in the last week, and by the end of August, the detailed designs will have been completed. It is expected that the project will go out to tender in early September. We learnt that the hub will now also have a council presence; so rather than tripping over to Leongatha to speak to someone about your planning and rates matters, it will be possible, for example, to make an appointment to speak to someone at a council desk here at the Hub while you're visiting Centrelink or browsing at the library, having your weekly senior cits lunch, or perhaps doing a course at Milpara. We cannot wait to see it all

Some concerns still exist over parking in Little Commercial Street, and of course with any venture of this size there will be some changes to parking. It will mean a reduction in parking in this area but not a reduction in overall parking for Korumburra. The design plan of this area that you may have seen floating around is a 'concept design' only and very much a work in progress. We are confident the outcome of the redevelopment will enhance the experience for all concerned. We just need to find a balance between business owners, employees, customers, and hub user.

By the end of the year you will also see works starting up around the railway precinct to the left of the Kellys/post office car park, where the current picnic tables and swings are. This area is to be transformed into a new entrylevel skate park, and will form part of a broader community space for all of us to enjoy, including plenty of allday parking.

And now the rail trail. Such great news to hear that we now have all the funding in place. The works will be delivered in two packages – one is the work necessary for all bridges between Leongatha and Nyora, and the other is for the trail itself. It's worth noting that the shire budget also

something which has been done by voluntary groups in the past. There are some heritage issues to be dealt with around our beautiful station, and these things always take time, but it is hoped that in two years the entire trail will be ready for us all to enjoy.

And finally, the construction works are nearing completion on the walkway from the Korumburra Secondary College to Guys Road. The walkway is both for pedestrian and bicycle use and is the corridor that links the school to the town. A bonus for school students and the general public alike and a great asset for the town. Given that most construction works have been undertaken in a Korumburra winter, it is truly a remarkable outcome!

We're so glad that in a time of so much isolation and uncertainty, there is a lot to look forward to in Korumburra. Stay tuned!



The announcement that regional Victoria will be returning to stage three restrictions has been a blow for all of us. Although the news was perhaps not entirely unexpected considering the increasing number of COVID-19 cases across Victoria, the restrictions mean that our movement and our ability timisedialise with friends and family will again be



This closure will be difficult for many people. Stage three restrictions were hard the first time but this time it is even more important that we work together, that we reach out to others and that we "be kind" to all. Many in our community are still struggling with the impacts of isolation from the first lockdown and our local businesses are only just in the process of getting back on their feet. They will need our support. The one benefit we have is that we have been through this already, we know we can get through it and we know how we can do better.

Here is a summary of some lockdown restrictions that are in place:

- There are only four reasons to leave your home:
 - √ necessary goods and services;
 - √ medical care or compassionate reasons;
 - √ exercise:
 - ✓ work and education if necessary.

Exemptions include visiting a person with whom you are in an intimate personal relationship, including inside metropolitan Melbourne.

Face coverings are mandatory.

- You cannot enter metropolitan Melbourne for exercise or recreation.
- You are unable to have visitors in your home. Meeting in public can be with up to two people or household members only.

- Outdoor sporting facilities will close except for facilities where public gathering and physical distancing limits can be adhered to and there is no use of shared equipment or communal facilities (except toilets), eg: tennis courts, golf courses.
- ✓ Outdoor sports will only be allowed with one other person, or household members, providing 1.5 metre distance can be maintained, eg: activities such as fishing, golfing, boating, tennis, surfing.
- Swimming pools and playgrounds will close.
- Libraries will close. Caring Calls, Tech Talks, Online Chat, home deliveries, online programs and events and other online resources including ebooks, eaudiobooks, emagazines, kids' reading and activities will all still be available. More details are available at wgrlc.vic.gov.au
- Community venues including halls will close other than to host an essential public support service (such as Alcoholics Anonymous), or a wedding or funeral. This covers Memorial Hall and its associated meeting rooms.
- Community Transport and the L2P program will be put on hold.
- All buildings and facilities managed by Council or through Section 86 Committees will close. This includes SPLASH and many halls and recreation reserves ‡. The outdoor facilities can still be used for casual activities – such as walking the dog or having a kick of the footy – but planned gatherings are not permitted. However please remember to respect the current social distancing guidelines to keep yourself and those around you safe. ‡ Botanical Park in Korumburra.
- ✓ Travel within regional Victoria is allowed for work and education (if necessary), necessary goods and services and care or compassionate purposes only.
- Visitor Information Centres, Coal Creek Community Park and Museum and Council-run caravan parks will remain closed.

Once some sort of normality returns, we are sure that outside people will be keen to visit our district again and coupled with the proposed growth of the Korumburra region and town precinct they will be prepared to stop and experience our local retail offer and put some cash back into our community.



Buying fresh produce in bulk from Grow Lightly in Korumburra

All bulk supplies and purchases are organised by our Produce Manager. The Produce Manager's working week starts on Sunday with a mailshot to our growers and producers to discuss stock availability for the coming week. All of our fresh produce comes from within 60 kilometres of Korumburra.

Mondays are dedicated to setting up and managing our on-line, bulk order shop. Bulk order customers are typically cafes and restaurants but we also have customers made up of two or three families who buy produce collectively to take advantage of the reduced prices. The online shop is hosted by the Open Food Network, which allows us to 'virtually' stock the shop with minimum effort. The on-line shop is open from midday until eight in the evening every Monday.

Once the on-line shop closes the Produce Manager confirms order with the growers/producers that evening.

Tuesdays and Wednesdays are all go, receiving deliveries and packing bulk orders. These are the best days as the team gets to see, and taste, the fresh produce as it comes through the door.

Melbourne buyers and they were interested in anything with a little bit of land around it. During the first round of restrictions we sold off a lot of our lifestyle properties on small acreage.

During this time, the team knew that we had to adapt to the changing circumstances and upskill in ways that would allow us to continue to service our vendors and buyers alike to the best of our ability. The team became very familiar programs which allowed us to sign authorities and contracts digitally, carry out virtual inspections and appraisals and also videoing and editing so

online buyer enquiry. Even now in August, the search activity in the buy section on realestate.com.au is up 36% compared to this time last year.

This latest restrictions are a little different as we are better prepared, however stock levels are down, the buyers are still there but stage 4 restricted buyers cannot physically inspect stage 3 restricted areas and we are doing all of these by virtual inspections. We are finding some property owners are not wanting to go to market just yet but what we are finding is if you do, you are currently selling in isolation rather than waiting until Spring/Summer when we expect there will be much more stock on the market and more choice for the buyer. It's a forever changing market but Elders is here to serve our vendors and buyers to ensure the best outcome for all.

Working with COVID-19

At first Burra Electrical thought this flu would just blow over, but as time went on we became very concerned on what the impact on the business could be. Even out here in South Gippsland

BES complied with all the government warnings & recommendations at every notification. At first it was extremely difficult to obtain face masks and sanitizer for all our staff. There were some new behavioural learning curves to adapt to for the new normal.

All our staff must wear masks to all service works. Use sanitiser at every job site (before and after), sanitise the vehicle when returning at the end of the day. i.e. steering wheel, gear stick, door handles etc.

Everywhere every staff member had to social distance from each other. Also requesting our clients to be socially distant as well whilst essential electrical theres were being conducted on their property. BES has had to make a COVID Safe Plan for our business as a WorkSafe requirement and as our suppliers and corporate customers require this as condition of working with With more people staying home and utilising their household power more heavily, this has lead to more electrical breakdowns and some dangerous switchboards to overload. People are starting to realise that their household energy costs were skyrocketing. This has lead to more interest and enquiries for solar PV, more efficient LED lighting, to reduce energy consumption and a lot more power and data connection points as homes are catering to more home entertainment and online work capacity. This has kept all facets of our business turning over.

One thing BES had already planned for in advance was that the administration of the BES office can be done remotely using the cloud about two years ago, essentially only requiring one person onsite. 
